Report of the directors

For the year ended 31 December 2006

The directors present their report and the financial statements for the year ended 31 December 2006.

Reference and administrative information set out on page one forms part of this report. The financial statements comply with current statutory requirements, the memorandum and articles of association and the Statement of Recommended Practice – Accounting and Reporting by Charities (issued in October 2000).

Activities and review

Demos is a company limited by guarantee with charitable objects.

The Charity's objects are governed by our Memorandum and Articles of Association which state that Demos exists:

- To promote education for the public benefit in issues of politics, economics, the environment and public policy;
- To promote for the public benefit research in any of the above fields of education and to publish the useful results of such research.

There have been no changes in the objects or the policies of the charity during the year. The principle activities of research, education and publication are reflected in the organisational structure of the charity. During the year the charity appointed its first Managing Director. The MD took responsibility for the management and development of the organisation reporting to the Director. The Director leads overall and specifically on the development of the intellectual and research agenda of the charity. Reporting to the Director are the head of programmes. Research projects are managed by all of these and by Senior Researchers. A team of Senior Researchers and Researchers undertake research projects, supported by temporary assistants and interns. Freelance collaborations are entered into to fulfil technical and consultancy roles, as well as helping with particular aspects of research, writing and the production of publications.

All staff are encouraged to contribute to any appropriate aspects of research, administration, the achievement of the charitable objects and the planning processes.

Our specific objectives for 2006 were:

- To increase Demos' profile as one of the UK's leading think-tanks
- To continue to improve the standards and quality of our research output
- To lessen the volatility of project funding aiming for a smoother income flow across the year
- To plan and manage the departure of Tom Bentley and his replacement by a new Director
- To continue to build our national and international network of supporters, associates and partners
- To continue to develop our relationships with politicians from across the political spectrum

Report of the directors

Overall 2006 saw us make good progress on all of these objectives. We continued to enjoy a high public profile and media presence throughout the year; many of our project launches and events received good coverage in the national media and Demos staff were regular contributors to radio and TV programmes and at conferences both in the UK and internationally. In addition the re-design and launch of our new award winning website was extremely well received by staff and public alike and has had significant impact on the our ability to communicate our work to the world. The quality of our work continued to improve and deliver against a high standard; the popularity of some of our publications, the degree to which our ideas clearly influenced the public policy agenda all point to satisfactory progress.

The management of our finances improved significantly over the course of the year with the implementation of new systems and cost control methods. Our associate network continued to grow over the year and our international relationships were strengthened through several projects and the increasing international profile of some of the senior staff. Relationships with other think-tanks globally continued to improve over 2006 with many guests speakers coming to the Demos London offices to host seminars, chair debates or take part in roundtable discussions. Demos also saw senior politicians from all the major UK political parties give speeches in Demos over the year with many more politicians from across the political parties attending our events and pamphlet launches. Only in the area of managing the transition from Tom Bentley to a new Director did find our objectives harder to reach. However with the eventual appointment of Dr Catherine Fieschi in December of 2006 that goal was eventually reached.

Looking ahead to 2007 our objectives will include:

- To strengthen the senior staff team in support of the new Director
- To grow our turnover by a minimum of 10% on our 2006 outturn
- To continue to improve the quality and standards of our research
- To develop our international profile and activities

Lectures, conferences and seminars

A wide range of lectures, events and conferences were organised by Demos during the year. On average, Demos hosts and organises two events each week, ranging from large-scale public debates to smaller scale seminars on particular issues. In addition Demos staff gave presentations and speeches, and took part in debates at conferences and events throughout the year. Notable events during the year included:

- A Northern Lights seminar series examining the future of Nordic Cities
- A seminar with Amartya Sen on the politics of identity
- A series of seminars on a range of security related topics with national and international experts A series of events with senior politicians including David Cameron, Douglas Alexander, Hilary
- Benn, John Reid, David Willets, Chris Hulne
- The Big Dream an event in Glasgow to imagine the future of the city
- The J Curve; a new way of thinking about foreign policy with lan Bremmer

Projects

A wide range of research projects were carried out during 2006, using a range of methodologies. Many projects involve case studies, and rely on qualitative data obtained from individual and/or group interviews. Our network of contacts with leading opinion formers and practitioners enables Demos to be particularly effective in this type of work. Additionally, where relevant techniques of quantitative data collection and analysis are also employed.

We undertook more than 65 projects during the year. Projects of particular note include:

- Atlas of Ideas project examining the newly emerging geography of scientific and technical innovation globally with specific focus on China, India and South Korea
- Received Wisdom looking at role and function of experts and the need to open up models of expertise fit for modern societal challenges
- Examining the crucial role played by black and minority ethnic voluntary organisations in community cohesion
- Re-imagining government in New Zealand, mapping the next steps in the reform of New Zealand's public services
- Exploring the application of service design concepts to public sector reform problems
- Building a manifesto for corporate security reforms in the face of increasing security challenges
- Community approaches to counter terrorism; exploring mechanisms to put communities at the heart of our responses to terrorism
- Exploring the public value of the family, challenging traditional notions of what families are for and why they matter more than ever in our changing communities
- Exploring the meaning of Professionalism and the future implications for the way in which we use professional authority and legitimacy

- Looking at the implications of a range of technologies that can enhance human performance and capacity
- Examining the technical and social implications of nanotechnology

Fixed assets

Changes in fixed assets are shown in note 7 to the financial statements.

Funds

The charity has a number of funds which are detailed in notes 12 and 13 in the financial statements.

Demos Projects Limited

The charity controls Demos Projects Limited (company number 2667039), a company limited by guarantee. Three Directors of Demos Projects Limited are also Directors of Demos and 2 Directors of Demos Projects Limited are also staff at Demos. The results of the subsisidary are shown in note 18 and have been consolidated with Demos results, all the profits made by the subsidiary are gift aided to Demos.

Reserves

The Directors intend to maintain a cash and debtors reserve sufficient to meet the company's obligations to all of its creditors and to staff. The cash and debtors balances position has declined over the last twelve months against our expectations and plans. The target of £900,000, which represents six months budgeted expenditure, has not been met this year. Currently total reserves are £393,199 and £72,890 of this is restricted to particular purposes. The Directors expect to make progress much better towards the six month target in 2007.

Risk assessment

A detailed risk assessment has been prepared in accordance with guidance set out by the Charity Commission. An agreed version of the risk assessment was formally adopted at the 2003 Annual General Meeting and procedures have been put in place to mitigate those risks identified.

Responsibilities of the directors

Company law requires the directors to prepare financial statements for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the state of the affairs of the charitable company and of its incoming resources and application of resources of the charitable company for that period. In preparing those financial statements, the directors are required to:

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently
- make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent
- state whether applicable accounting standards have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements

 prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to assume that the company will continue on that basis

The directors are responsible for keeping proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charitable company and to enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 1985. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charitable company and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

Each of the directors confirms that to the best of his/her knowledge there is no information relevant to the audit of which the auditors are unaware. The directors also confirm that they have taken all necessary steps to ensure that they themselves are aware of all relevant audit information and that this information has been communicated to the auditors.

All directors are members of the charitable company and guarantee to contribute to the assets of the company in the event of it being wound up such amounts as may be required not exceeding £1. The number of guarantees at 31 December 2006 was 6 (2005 - 11). The directors have no beneficial interest in the charitable company nor in its activities and are not remunerated. A register of business interests is maintained.

Method of recruitment of new directors

New directors can be nominated by any of the current directors. New directors are elected by the current board at a General Meeting. New directors are found to replace members coming to the end of their term of office and also to strengthen the skills and experience of the director group as a whole.

Method of induction of new directors

All new directors are given an in-depth induction to the organisation through meetings with senior officers and the Chair of Directors. All new directors are also furnished with relevant documentation including examples of recent work, minutes of meetings and our annual report.

Notes to the financial statements

For the year ended 31 December 2006

1. Accounting policies

- a) The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with applicable accounting standards. They follow the recommendations in the Statement of Recommended Practice, Accounting and Reporting by Charities (issued in March 2005) and the Companies Act 1985.
 - The Statement of Financial Activities ("SOFA") and Balance Sheet consolidate the results of Demos and its subsidiary Demos Projects Limited on a line by line basis. A separate SOFA is not presented because Demos has taken advantage of the provisions of paragraph 304 of the SORP.
- b) Voluntary income is received by way of donations and gifts and is included in full in the Statement of Financial Activities when receivable. Gifts in kind and donated services and facilities are not included unless they represent goods or services which would have otherwise been purchased, in which case they are valued and brought in as income and the appropriate expenditure.
- c) Revenue grants are credited to the Statement of Financial Activities when received or receivable whichever is earlier, unless they relate to a specific future period, in which case they are deferred.
- d) Earned income from the sales of subscriptions is shown net of Value Added Tax.
- e) Contractual income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities when the orgainsation fulfils the its contractual terms, where the amounts receivable can be reasonably measured and the recoverability is certain.
- f) Rental income is included in the Statement of Financial Activities in the period which it is receivable.
- g) Restricted funds are to be used for specific purposes as laid down by the donor. Expenditure which meets these criteria is charged to the funds.
- h) Unrestricted funds are donations and other incoming resources received or generated for the charitable purposes.
- i) Costs of generating funds relate to the costs incurred by the charitable company in inducing third parties to make voluntary contributions to it.
- j) Resources expended are allocated to the particular activity where the cost relates directly to that activity. Resources expended include attributable VAT which cannot be recovered. However, the cost of overall direction and administration of each activity, comprising the salary and overhead costs of the central function, is apportioned on the following basis which is an estimate, based on staff time, of the amount attributable to each activity.

1. Accounting policies (continued)

j) Governance costs include the management of the charitable company's assets, organisational management and compliance with constitutional and statutory requirements.

Support costs are re-allocated to each of the activities on the following basis which is an estimate, based on staff time, of the amount attributable to each activity:

- k) Grants payable are included in the statement of financial activities in the year they are payable.
- I) Depreciation is provided on all tangible fixed assets at rates calculated to write off the cost of each asset over its expected useful life. The depreciation rates in use are as follows:

Office equipment : 5 years Computer equipment : 3 years

Depreciation costs are allocated to activities on the basis of the use of the related assets in those activities.

Items costing under £500 are not capitalised.

- m) Rentals payable under operating leases, where substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership remain with the lessor, are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities in the year in which they fall due.
- n) Stocks are stated at the lower of cost and net realisable value. In general, cost is determined on a first in first out basis and includes transport and handling costs. Net realisable value is the price at which stocks can be sold in the normal course of business after allowing for the costs of realisation. Provision is made where necessary for obsolete, slow moving and defective stocks.
- o) The charitable company contributes to a stakeholder pension scheme. The assets of the scheme are held separately from those of the charitable company in an independently administered fund. The pension cost charge represents contributions payable under the scheme by the charitable company to the fund. The charitable company has no liability under the scheme other than for the payment of those contributions.
- p) Where a restricted fund does not cover the full costs of the specific activity it is given for, a transfer is made from the unrestricted fund to compensate the shortfall where appropriate.
