#### Report of the directors

#### For the year ended 31 December 2007

The directors present their report and the financial statements for the year ended 31 December 2007.

Reference and administrative information set out on page one forms part of this report. The financial statements comply with current statutory requirements, the memorandum and articles of association and the Statement of Recommended Practice – Accounting and Reporting by Charities (issued in March 2005).

#### Activities and review

Demos is a company limited by guarantee with charitable objects.

The Charity's objects are governed by our Memorandum and Articles of Association which state that Demos exists:

- To promote education for the public benefit in issues of politics, economics, the environment and public policy;
- To promote for the public benefit research in any of the above fields of education and to publish the useful results of such research.

There have been no changes in the objects or the policies of the charity during the year. The principle activities of research, education and publication are reflected in the organisational structure of the charity. The overall management of Demos is the responsibility of the Director who provides leadership to the organisation and specifically leads the development of the intellectual and research agenda of the charity. Reporting to the Director are the head of programmes. Research projects are managed by all of these and by Senior Researchers. A team of Senior Researchers and Researchers undertake research projects, supported by temporary assistants and interns. Freelance collaborations are entered into to fulfil technical and consultancy roles, as well as helping with particular aspects of research, writing and the production of publications.

All staff are encouraged to contribute to any appropriate aspects of research, administration, the achievement of the charitable objects and the planning processes.

Our specific objectives for 2007 were:

- To focus on renewing and developing the Demos brand
- To continue to improve the standards and quality of our research output
- To achieve a more robust financial position
- To develop the Demos leadership team
- To continue to develop our relationships with politicians from across the political spectrum

Overall 2007 saw positive progress on the non-financial objectives. However this was over-shadowed by a failure in financial control processes, causing a severe worsening of the organisation's financial position which led to the significant financial loss for the year and elimination of Demos's retained reserves. Towards the end of the year the problem was identified as being the consistent underestimation of the time and costs of projects, and steps were taken to improve the project costing process and to ensure that all proposals were subject to financial review before being submitted.

Looking ahead to 2008 our objectives will include:

- To prepare and implement a recovery plan to achieve a turnaround of the organisation's finances
- To reduce headcount to a smaller core staff working at high utilisation
- To develop a broader cadre of Associates who can support Demos's projects
- To implement robust finance and business processes

In addition Demos staff gave presentations and speeches, and took part in debates at conferences and events throughout the year. Notable events during the year included:

- A series of seminars on integration and participation with the Embassy of the Netherlands

#### **Projects**

A wide range of research projects were carried out during 2007, using a range of methodologies. Many projects involve case studies, and rely on qualitative data obtained from individual and/or group interviews. Our network of contacts with leading opinion formers and practitioners enables Demos to be particularly effective in this type of work. Additionally, where relevant techniques of quantitative data collection and analysis are also employed. Projects of particular note include:

- Extending the Atlas of Ideas project (examining the newly emerging geography of scientific and technical innovation globally) to include Europe.
- For Your Information research into the new politics of personal information, and the implications for individuals, for businesses, and for government.
- A study of Knowledge Nomads, to understand what inspires or inhibits the movement of highly skilled highly mobile workers.
- Making it Personal a major publication setting out a tranformative, participative approach to social care through advocating self-directed services
- The Everyday Democracy Index a new tool to measure and compare the democratic health of nations, taking on board people's lived experience of democracy and not just formal political activity.
- The Politics of Public Behaviour a Demos edited collection of essays debating the public implications of private decisions.
- UK Confidential an essay collection exploring the transformation of our social lives and the increases in surveillance and technological innovation.
- A Common Language which sets out how English provision for speakers of different languages (ESOL) is vital to social inclusion, economic success, and individual empowerment.
- The Skills Paradox uncovers a worrying polarisation in skills amongst British citizens and the need for a coherent skills strategy in our labour market and training systems.
- The Talking Cure argues that improving the quality of converstaion between doctors and patients
   and not just focusing on new technologies is key to the future of health care in an age where prevention and chronic illness management have become our top priority.
- The Future Face of Enterprise argues that creating a new enterprise culture requires a renewed interest in risk taking, a revised attitude to failure, and a structure for incentivising creativity.

#### Funds

The charity has a number of funds which are detailed in notes 12 and 13 in the financial statements.

#### **Demos Projects Limited**

The charity controls Demos Projects Limited (company number 2667039), a company limited by guarantee. Three Directors of Demos Projects Limited are also Directors of Demos and 2 Directors of Demos Projects Limited are also staff at Demos. The results of the subsisidary are shown in note 18 and have been consolidated with Demos results, all the profits made by the subsidiary are gift aided to Demos.

#### Reserves

The Directors intend to maintain a cash and debtors reserve sufficient to meet the company's obligations to all of its creditors and to staff. The cash and debtors balances position has declined over the last twelve months against our expectations and plans. The target of £900,000, which represents six months budgeted expenditure, has not been met this year.

#### Risk assessment

A detailed risk assessment has been prepared in accordance with guidance set out by the Charity Commission. An agreed version of the risk assessment was formally adopted at the 2003 Annual General Meeting and procedures have been put in place to mitigate those risks identified.

#### Responsibilities of the directors

Company law requires the directors to prepare financial statements for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the state of the affairs of the charitable company and of its incoming resources and application of resources of the charitable company for that period. In preparing those financial statements, the directors are required to:

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently
- make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent
- state whether applicable accounting standards have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to assume that the company will continue on that basis

The directors are responsible for keeping proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charitable company and to enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 1985. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charitable company and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

Each of the directors confirms that to the best of his/her knowledge there is no information relevant to the audit of which the auditors are unaware. The directors also confirm that they have taken all necessary steps to ensure that they themselves are aware of all relevant audit information and that this information has been communicated to the auditors.

All directors are members of the charitable company and guarantee to contribute to the assets of the company in the event of it being wound up such amounts as may be required not exceeding £1. The number of guarantees at 31 December 2007 was 6 (2006 - 6). The directors have no beneficial interest in the charitable company nor in its activities and are not remunerated. A register of business interests is maintained.

#### Method of recruitment of new directors

New directors can be nominated by any of the current directors. New directors are elected by the current board at a General Meeting. New directors are found to replace members coming to the end of their term of office and also to strengthen the skills and experience of the director group as a whole.

#### Method of induction of new directors

All new directors are given an in-depth induction to the organisation through meetings with senior officers and the Chair of Directors. All new directors are also furnished with relevant documentation including examples of recent work, minutes of meetings and our annual report.

#### **Auditors**

Sayer Vincent were re-appointed as the charitable company's auditors during the year and have expressed their willingness to continue in that capacity.

#### Independent auditors' report

We have audited the financial statements of Demos for the year ended 31 December 2007 which comprise the statement of financial activities, balance sheet and related notes. These financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out therein.

This report is made solely to the charitable company's members, as a body, in accordance with section 235 of the Companies Act 1985. Our audit work has been undertaken so that we might state to the charitable company's members those matters we are required to state to them in an auditors' report and for no other purpose. To the fullest extent permitted by law, we do not accept or assume responsibility to anyone other than the charitable company and the charitable company's members as a body, for our audit work, for this report, or for the opinions we have formed.

#### Respective responsibilities of the directors and auditors

The responsibilities of the directors (who are also the directors of Demos for the purposes of company law) for preparing the annual report and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice), are set out in the statement of responsibilities of the directors.

Our responsibility is to audit the financial statements in accordance with relevant legal and regulatory requirements and International Standards on Auditing (UK and Ireland).

We report to you our opinion as to whether the financial statements give a true and fair view and are properly prepared in accordance with the Companies Act 1985. We also report to you whether the information given in the annual report of the directors is consistent with the financial statements. In addition we report to you if, in our opinion, the charitable company has not kept proper accounting records, if we have not received all the information and explanations we require for our audit, or if information specified by law regarding the directors' remuneration and other transactions is not disclosed.

We read the annual report and consider the implications for our report if we become aware of any apparent misstatements within it.

#### Basis of opinion

We conducted our audit in accordance with International Standards on Auditing (UK and Ireland) issued by the Auditing Practices Board. An audit includes examination, on a test basis, of evidence relevant to the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. It also includes an assessment of the significant estimates and judgements made by the directors in the preparation of the financial statements, and of whether the accounting policies are appropriate to the charitable company's circumstances, consistently applied and adequately disclosed.

We planned and performed our audit so as to obtain all the information and explanations which we considered necessary in order to provide us with sufficient evidence to give reasonable assurance that the financial statements are free from material misstatement, whether caused by fraud or other irregularity or error. In forming our opinion we also evaluated the overall adequacy of the presentation of information in the financial statements.

At 31 December 2007 the charitable company had net liabilities of £135,982, but secured loan funding during 2008 to support the charitable company's cashflow requirements. Providing the loan continues to be available to the charitable company, it is appropriate to prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis as described in note 1(a) to the financial statements, but we consider that these disclosures should be brought to your attention.

#### Notes to the financial statements

#### For the year ended 31 December 2007

#### 1. Accounting policies

a) The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with applicable accounting standards. They follow the recommendations in the Statement of Recommended Practice, Accounting and Reporting by Charities (issued in March 2005) and the Companies Act 1985.

The Statement of Financial Activities ("SOFA") and Balance Sheet consolidate the results of Demos and its subsidiary Demos Projects Limited on a line by line basis. A separate SOFA is not presented because Demos has taken advantage of the provisions of paragraph 304 of the SORP.

#### Going concern

At 31 December 2007, the balance sheet showed net liabilities of £135,982. As directors, we have put a recovery plan in place to ensure that Demos is able to continue as a going concern. In particular, we have secured a loan facility to assist cashflow. We are confident that such actions will improve results for the charitable company in 2008 and 2009. Thus we consider it appropriate to prepare the financial statements on a going concern basis.

- b) Voluntary income is received by way of donations and gifts and is included in full in the Statement of Financial Activities when receivable. Gifts in kind and donated services and facilities are not included unless they represent goods or services which would have otherwise been purchased, in which case they are valued and brought in as income and the appropriate expenditure.
- c) Revenue grants are credited to the Statement of Financial Activities when received or receivable whichever is earlier, unless they relate to a specific future period, in which case they are deferred.
- d) Earned income from the sales of subscriptions is shown net of Value Added Tax.
- e) Contractual income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities when the organisation fulfils its contractual terms, where the amounts receivable can be reasonably measured and the recoverability is certain.
- f) Rental income is included in the Statement of Financial Activities in the period which it is receivable.
- g) Restricted funds are to be used for specific purposes as laid down by the donor. Expenditure which meets these criteria is charged to the funds.
- h) Unrestricted funds are donations and other incoming resources received or generated for the charitable purposes.
- i) Costs of generating funds relate to the costs incurred by the charitable company in inducing third parties to make voluntary contributions to it.

#### 1. Accounting policies (continued)

j) Resources expended are allocated to the particular activity where the cost relates directly to that activity. Resources expended include attributable VAT which cannot be recovered. However, the cost of overall direction and administration of each activity, comprising the salary and overhead costs of the central function, is apportioned on the following basis which is an estimate, based on staff time, of the amount attributable to each activity.

Governance costs include the management of the charitable company's assets, organisational management and compliance with constitutional and statutory requirements.

Support costs are re-allocated to each of the activities on the following basis which is an estimate, based on staff time, of the amount attributable to each activity:

Projects	80%
Publications and subscriptions	6%
Events and seminars	9%
Governance	5%

- k) Grants payable are included in the statement of financial activities in the year they are payable.
- I) Tangible fixed assets costing more than £500 are capitalised in the balance sheet at purchase cost plus the cost of bringing the asset into working condition for its intended use. Depreciation is provided on all tangible fixed assets at rates calculated to write off the cost of each asset over its expected useful life. The depreciation rates in use are as follows:

Office equipment: 5 years Computer equipment: 3 years

Depreciation costs are allocated to activities on the basis of the use of the related assets in those activities.

Assets are reviewed for impairment if circumstances indicate that their carrying amount may not be recoverable. Impaired assets are written down to their recoverable value being the higher of their net realisable value and value in use.

- m) Rentals payable under operating leases, where substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership remain with the lessor, are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities in the year in which they fall due.
- n) Stocks are stated at the lower of cost and net realisable value. In general, cost is determined on a first in first out basis and includes transport and handling costs. Net realisable value is the price at which stocks can be sold in the normal course of business after allowing for the costs of realisation. Provision is made where necessary for obsolete, slow moving and defective stocks.

#### 1. Accounting policies (continued)

- o) The charitable company contributes to a stakeholder pension scheme. The assets of the scheme are held separately from those of the charitable company in an independently administered fund. The pension cost charge represents contributions payable under the scheme by the charitable company to the fund. The charitable company has no liability under the scheme other than for the payment of those contributions.
- p) Where a restricted fund does not cover the full costs of the specific activity it is given for, a transfer is made from the unrestricted fund to compensate the shortfall where appropriate.
